New Medicare Cards

By the time this newsletter reaches your mailbox, the new Medicare cards for our area should be almost completely mailed to our area. The new cards are mailed out automatically, there is nothing you need to do to get the card sent to you. So what should you do when you receive your new card in the mail?

-First, you should carry your new Medicare card with you. Your doctors and healthcare providers know the new cards are on the way and will need you to provide them your new card so their records will be up-to-date.

-Second, you should destroy your old Medicare card in a secure way, remember the old card has your social security number and could potentially put you at risk for identity theft if it were to fall into the wrong hands! If you don't have a way to securely dispose of your old Medicare card, please bring it to City Hall and we will shred it for you.

-Third, keep any Medicare Advantage Plan cards and supplemental insurance cards. Just because your Medicare card has changed, these cards will not change.

-Fourth, safeguard your new Medicare number just like you did your previous number. Only give your new Medicare number to your healthcare professionals, pharmacists, or anyone you trust to handle your Medicare issues on your behalf.

What should you do if you haven't gotten your card yet? You can log into your MyMedicare.gov account to see when your card was mailed. If mailing has finished in your area and you still have not received your card, call 1-800-MEDICARE. There might be a problem that needs corrected, such as updating your mailing address.

Grass Clippings and Leaves

Are grass clippings and leaves on the road dangerous and illegal? The simple answer is YES! According to State Statute 92.77:

It shall be unlawful to place, push, or deposit snow, sleet, ice, or mud, or any debris, including leaves, grass, and branches, from private property into the streets of the city.

Grass clippings on the road pose a danger to motorists as they are primarily composed of water, so when tires from a car have clippings between them and the roadway it greatly reduces traction, not to mention the dangers that clippings on the road can mean to motorcyclists! Large clumps of grass and leaf debris can obscure potential hazards in the roadway, and can make it difficult to discern where the roadway ends and curbs begin.

Grass clippings and leaves getting swept into storm drains can also cause costly drainage issues. Even though they are small, leaves and clippings getting swept into storm drains can end up in area waterways or can cause plug ups of storm drains causing flooding. Organic matter that gets washed down storm drains and into waterways, or get caught in storm drain systems and remain constantly wet are also the cause of putrid odors.

Clippings can always be mulched back into your yard, or can be disposed of in the proper area at the compost pile located on West Hickory Street. Please be sure to only dispose of clippings, leaves, garden waste, and tree limbs and only in their respective areas. Construction lumber, plastic bags, residential refuse, and hazardous wastes are **not allowed in the compost pile at any time.**
